Thank you for your comments.

I deliberated whether to include the quotation from Dr Mohajer as I also found the comment to be inaccurate and misleading. The statement doesn't explicitly state that the correct resuscitation device should have been used and also implies that oxygen is delivered direct from the cylinder. I was also not comfortable with the use of the terminology "the correct amount of oxygen" as opposed to delivering oxygen at the correct PIP and flow rate.

I will remove that last quoted paragraph as it serves no purpose.

Thanks – I am happy with this which is factual account.

If the Tom Thumb device had been in the circuit as was intended, the pressure of oxygen from the wall supply would have been limited and the baby would not have died – of extensive air leaks. The circuit was bypassed. I seem to remember we had some photographs taken by Dr Bob Welch when he arrived on the scene. I no longer have anything relating to this case.

The RCPCH resuscitation booklet did specifically warn of the dangers of not resuscitating babies with oxygen which had not been passed through a pressure limiting device. Sadly this is not the only case I've advised on where this has happened. Dr Mohajer is an obstetrician, not a neonatologist. She is not right – oxygen should never be given direct from a cylinder either. It would be best if this quote was removed because it is not accurate. Dear Dr Rennie,

I apologise for the unsolicited contact after such a long period of time but I am currently reviewing the technical files for the Viamed Tom Thumb infant resuscitator in accordance with the requirements of the latest ISO standards and I am hoping that you can offer some vital information from many years ago.

You will recall, I'm sure, the distressing incident that occurred in August 2000 at Royal Shrewsbury Hospital involving the fatality of a newborn during a failed resuscitation attempt.

At that time, I sent you a Tom Thumb TT480 infant resuscitator at the request of a DS Andrews of West Mercia CID for you to assess in your expert capacity.

We understand that the Tom Thumb was exonerated from direct involvement in the fatality as it had been bypassed from the system and a higher pressure oxygen source had been used in its place, however, I have been unable to locate a report or formal communication that substantiates this in writing; I only have text summaries of phone calls and newspaper reports retrieved after the inquest.

My question is whether you would be so kind as to review my summary of the incident as viewed from Viamed's perspective (condensed to a single side of A4) and offer any comments or clarification that you see fit.

I do not wish to send this if you are unwilling or professionally able to respond but, if you would like to comment, with your permission I would like to forward the summary.

I should stress that there is no legal connotation to this request; this is a technical exercise to update our product files to show the results of any and all investigations in which the Tom Thumb was involved, and the more information that we have, the better.

Please could I ask that you kindly acknowledge receipt of my email, even if your response to my request is negative. Thank you in advance and I look forward to hearing from you.
